1. Title of the project

Pilot Project 'Support Measures for Small-Scale Fishing' - Baltic and North Sea (Agreement Number MARE/2014/04 – SI2.727556) implemented by Low Impact Fishers of Europe

2. Objectives

The intention of the project has been to build the capacity of European smaller scale, low impact fishers and their organisations to participate in the decision-making processes across the board that affect their livelihoods and will support the exchange of information and experience of good practice between them to achieve these aims.

To achieve this overall aim in the specific context of the Baltic and North Seas, particular attention has been given to and the project actions have been directed at the following areas:

- a) build capacity of L.I.F.E Members [NB: LIFE has both coastal and inland fisher organisations in membership] and other small scale fishers within and between Member States in the region to participate in the advisory and decision making process that affect their livelihoods, with a specific focus on enabling them to participate fully and effectively in the present Advisory Councils (ACs), be fully involved in the development of any new AC's and in other fora and platforms pursuing the objective of sustainable management of fisheries;
- b) enable and otherwise facilitate L.I.F.E Members and other small-scale fishers to share information, knowledge and experiences of good practices within and between all EU Member States within the Region with regard to the creation and development of representative bodies for low impact fishing, membership criteria, its socio economic and cultural value and how to disseminate their knowledge and experiences more widely.
- to facilitate the creation and development of networks of small scale fishers that promote local, cross border and regional projects and increase the sector's involvement in stakeholder organisations.

To provide meetings to provide guidance and training in support of the above.

3. Executive summary

With a total of 67 meetings attended or self-organized, several of which were dedicated to Capacity Building and Exchange of Best Practice, the project has been successful in building the capacity of small-scale, low impact fishers in Baltic and North Sea Regions to self-represent themselves in the relevant advisory and decision-making fora, as summarized in the table below:

The main focus of the project has been on the Baltic Sea, given the high importance of small-scale fishers in that Region, and many possibilities to present small-scale fishers' views to influence policy decisions, in particular within BALTFISH and HELCOM fora. Almost all of the project's indicators (Expected Results and their Use) have been attained and in many cases exceeded. For a complete analysis see Table 2. under Section 4.3. Deliverables.

From the start, the project has intended to focus as many activities as possible on real policy processes and developments, and within them – on matters of genuine interest to small-scale fishers' communities in the project area. To make this approach viable, the project timeline was fine-tuned with the timing of milestone events in the Common Fisheries Policy decision-making and advisory cycle.

Following the initial phase of the project, consisting in particular of numerous activities aiming at in-depth understanding of the needs of project addressees, it has become clear that

subsequent project (and post-project) actions should be predominantly aimed at the following broad areas of fisheries management, on issues of direct relevance for small-scale fishers:

- 1. Regional policy actions discussed and (pre-)decided at sea-basin level, in particular: fishing opportunities and attached conditions, technical measures.
- 2. Interactions between fisheries and environment in an Ecosystem-Based Fisheries Management (EBFM) context, with particular attention to problems posed by interactions between certain predators (grey seals, black cormorants) and small-scale fishers.
- 3. Participation in and impact on Maritime Spatial Planning processes of relevance to small-scale fishers, where proper analysis of and response to underlying documents is often beyond the capacity of small-scale fishers' organizations (with a view to reducing inter-gear conflicts, building synergies with conservation, minimizing impact of blue growth projects on small scale fisheries).
- 4. Focusing the attention of decision-makers on the need to support small-scale fishers through help in placing their products in appropriate market niches, including through direct/short chain marketing channels, (e.g. by using novel marketing techniques, including web-based ones), and, where necessary, improving quality and handling of such products post-catch, at landing and post-landing.

The lion's share of project activities was realized at sea-basin, national and regional levels, as the project's design structure allowed to reach deeply into regional and local practicalities of small-scale fisheries in the Baltic and North Seas, in order to build the understanding of their situations. As a follow-up, the project assisted small-scale fishers in formulating the suggestions on how to address their problems and present them to the relevant advisory and decision-making bodies. Particular attention was given to sea-basin level matters, such as impact of seals on small-scale fishers. Brussels-level actions have been confined to communicating key specific points to the most relevant decision-makers, bearing in mind the timing determined by the policy-making and implementation cycle.

The capacity-building and informational aspects have been identified as very important elements of the project from the start, as it allows for meaningful participation in EU-level, sea-basin, national and regional decision-making and consultation processes. Therefore, capacity-building and information provision formed part of every major activity organized by the project.

The results in terms of self-representation are best summarized by obtaining a BSAC Executive Committee membership by one of the small-scale fishers' organizations participating in the project, and two organizations joining the BSAC General Assembly. The project implementation has shown that the key to positive developments in Europe's small-scale fisheries communities is to help them offer decent jobs, in order to i.a. address an intergenerational problem of renewing the labour force in the small-scale fisheries. This may be achieved by:

1. helping small-scale fishers to implement the "class, not the mass" philosophy, i.e. to extract, in a low-impact manner, the seafood of top freshness, best quality, local and traditional nature, and to place it firmly within high added-value market niches. Such products will by nature be limited in quantity, and the CFP should help in placing them in the market segments offering the highest added value per unit of fish sold. According to STECF's Annual Economic Report 2017, small-scale fisheries' (SSF) landings and income show declining trends EU wide, but performance indicators GVA

- (67%) and profit margins (24%) are positive. Improved access to resources and access to markets is therefore vital for SSF to survive and thrive.
- 2. making an effort to <u>understand small-scale fisheries' situations in depth</u>. The CFP already has useful instrument in the action plan for the development, competitiveness and sustainability of small-scale coastal fishing, which forms part of EMFF programming toolbox. Its use could be broadened and prioritized to achieve this aim. Furthermore, the STECF and the data collection system could be more focused on obtaining economic data on small-scale segments, with métiers defined at a regional level (within Member State), to facilitate in-depth economic analyses.
- 3. <u>improvements of the CFP delivery system, so that it can offer tailor-made solutions to problems identified at local and regional level</u> (within Member State). The CFP already has a useful instrument in this regard in FLAGs, which could be given more tools to respond to management problems identified and to provide solutions at this level in a bottom-up process.
- 4. making an in-depth review of the current forms and the practice of sector organization and update the Common Market Organization system to truly recognize specific characteristics of the small-scale sector, and facilitate the implementation of "class, not the mass" philosophy. This should, in particular, take the form of facilitating the establishment of small-scale fishers' Producer Organizations.
- 5. <u>strengthened and broadened operation of pan-European networks of small-scale fishers</u>, including their dedicated local, regional and national-level organizations and representatives, as they are capable of providing the crucial Capacity-Building, Best Practice Exchange, self-representation assistance and advice on local small-scale fisheries management, including using co-management solutions where identified as relevant.

Low Impact Fishers of Europe have ensured a continuation of the main actions implemented under the project for 12 months after its completion, except cost-intensive capacity-building and training activities, with the use of non-EU funds available to it. This will help to ensure a longer lasting positive impact of the project on small-scale fishers and their communities in the project area, but in the longer term will depend on LIFE's ability to raise further funding in support of this work. In this regard, LIFE is committed to ensuring that the actions in the project area are properly continued in the longer run, as the need for continuous small-scale fishers' network expansion and management is very clear.

4. Detailed description

4.1. Bodies involved

The beneficiaries of the action have been the small-scale fishers and their organizations across the project area. In assisting them and ensuring that their voices are being heard, engagement has been established in and, where applicable, strengthened with:

We consider that the simple & interactive format of tutorial video + written support is the best way to convey the message. Given that the concept costs for the tutorials surpassed the budget allocated under the BANS Project, LIFE has covered this expense from own funds. The Best Practice Guide budget line will be used to dub the tutorial videos and print the Best Practice guide in the languages of the Project.

4.4 Timeline: planning and next steps **Planning**

The initial planning for the project was made taking into consideration the starting date of 15 December 2015, as originally planned, for a period of 2 years, until December 2017. Due to a delay in granting the funds, the project could only be started on 4 April 2016. The Commission's consent to prolong the project by 3 months – until 31 March 2018 – helped to ensure that the initial delay has had no impact whatsoever on the attainment of project objectives and ensuring the deliverables are met.

From the start, the project has intended to focus as many activities as possible on real policy processes and developments, and within them – on matters of genuine interest to small-scale fishers' communities in the project area. To make this approach viable, the project timeline was fine-tuned with the timing of milestone events in the Common Fisheries Policy decision-making and advisory cycle, especially those organized by BSAC, BALTFISH and later HELCOM, as well as those pertaining to Fishing Opportunities Councils of EU Ministers. This methodology allowed to

- create a high level of interest in activities of advisory platforms (such as ACs) and decision-making bodies (such as BALTFISH, HELCOM where relevant) among smallscale fishers in the project area;
- facilitate the small-scale fishers in making a real and constructive contribution to policy processes of relevance to them (such as Fishing Opportunities or fishers-predators interactions);
- place the project's capacity-building activities in a practical context, highly relevant for the small-scale fishers.

Next steps

Low Impact Fishers of Europe have ensured a continuation of the main actions implemented under this project for 12 months after its completion, but not including the cost-intensive capacity-building and training activities, with the use of non-EU funds available to it. This will help to ensure a longer lasting positive impact of the project on small-scale fishers and their communities in the project area, but in the longer term this will depend on LIFE's ability to raise further funding in support of this work. In this regard, LIFE is committed to shall spare no effort ensuring that the actions in the project area are properly continued in the longer run, as the need for continuous small-scale fishers' network expansion and management is very clear.

The deliverables of the present project could usefully be supplied and enhanced through:

- facilitating a more proactive contribution of small-scale fishers towards scientific underpinning of the Common Fisheries Policy, in particular through the establishment of a constructive working relations with STECF and ICES, as well as with various Ecosystem-Based Management contexts relevant to fisheries policy. An improved reporting of catches, based on modern electronic means and extensive testing with small-scale fishers during pilot phase, could add value to the knowledge possessed by scientific and management circles in relation to fish stocks and wider marine environment – mainly in coastal areas;
- 2. prioritization of innovative, local situation-based, bottom-up activities improving added value of products obtained by small-scale fishers, best summarized by their motto: "class, not the mass" (used courtesy of Mr Wolfgang Albrecht, Fischereischutzverband Schleswig Holstein). For certain areas and communities, this

extends to targeted investments, both in hardware and know-how, ensuring the highest possible product quality on board, at and post-landing. In this context, of particular importance is the correct use of the existing and the set-up of new EU funding possibilities;

- a deeper, more regular and comprehensive collaboration with Farnet network and FLAGs on matters beyond their current remit, in particular: co-management of local resources, contribution to scientific knowledge, solving sea-basin-wide environmental and/or management issues (such as fishers-predators interactions), more proactive participation in Maritime Spatial Planning processes at national and regional level;
- 4. a number of concrete changes in EU law, which are enumerated in detail in points 6.2. and 6.3.

5. Evaluation

5.1 Demonstrated results

Overview of actions delivered in 2016

- i. Various meetings with small-scale fishers' organizations from the area of operation to understand their situation in-depth and support them as needed, both at meetings themselves and in subsequent contacts – with a view to creating a functioning regional network.
- ii. Active participation by fishers in most meetings and activities of Baltic Sea Advisory Council and in relevant meetings of North Sea Advisory Council.
- iii. Assistance in a successful bid for one LIFE Member Organization (Fischereischutzverband Schleswig-Holstein/Germany) to join Baltic Sea Advisory Council's General Assembly, with an initial acceptance of their ExCom candidature, to be confirmed at a later stage (see below).
- iv. Activating other LIFE Member Organizations (SYEF, Sveriges Yrkefiskares Ekonomiska Förening/Sweden, Darlowska Grupa Producentow Ryb/Poland, NetVISwerk/Netherlands) within the BSAC, NSAC and other important regional processes, such as BALTFISH.
- v. Facilitation of 3 Member Organizations joining LIFE.
- vi. Organization of a major Workshop in Warsaw, with invited SSF organizations, but open to all interested small-scale, low impact fishers, with the following aims:
 - Getting small-scale, low impact fishers acquainted with the EU Institutions and decision-making processes relating to fisheries policy;
 - the nature of Advisory Councils,
 - European Maritime and Fisheries Fund,
 - National quota management
 - Landing Obligation, including the information on Discardless project
- vii. Assistance and facilitation in elaboration by small-scale, low impact fishers concerned of Action Plans:
 - o for Western Baltic cod stock in view of 2017 ICES advice for the stock;
 - for Seabass stocks, in view of 2017 ICES advice for the stock;

Following the elaboration of both Plans, intensive action was undertaken to popularize their content vis-à-vis the relevant addresses at all levels covered by the Project, with particular attention to decision-makers, other groups representing fisheries interests, as well as working to elevate the interest of wider public in the Plans through strong presence on the Internet, including Social Media;

viii. Preparing the application for LIFE Observer Status within HELCOM

Overview of actions delivered in 2017-2018

- i. Putting on the BSAC ExCom table a set of proposals facilitating the access of small-scale fishers to its work starting a discussion about on-demand interpretation services (tabled in January 2017) and additional compensation to small-scale fishers for attending BSAC meetings (tabled in June 2017). These have resulted in a "pilot project" by BSAC offering the additional compensations and, more importantly, decision taken by BSAC to allocate substantial funds to fully-fledged cabin interpretation if requested by the fishers (January 2018)
- ii. Establishing initial contacts with market players and attending, together with fishers, events having the potential to add value to products obtained by small-scale fishers. Given the complexity of the matter, vast regional/national differences in the project area, and a number of innovative solutions already applied in Denmark and Germany (also by LIFE Member Organizations), the involvement of BANS Coordinator in this action was confined to Poland and, to a lesser extent, Germany, resulting in i.a. signing a Memorandum of Understanding between LIFE and National Chamber of Gastronomy and Catering operating in Poland.
- iii. The initial work mentioned in p. ii. above resulted in partially dedicating one of the Best Practice Exchange events to providing examples of best market approaches to adding value to fish products offered by small-scale fishers. Furthermore, the project served to strengthen an already established cooperation between LIFE and the organizers of Olivier Roellinger Concours (https://www.ethic-ocean.org/fr/activites/produits-de-la-mer/chefs-cuisiniers-et-restaurateurs/concours-olivier-roellinger/?lang=fr), by ensuring the presence of small-scale fishers at the jury of the Concours' eliminations relevant for the project area.
- iv. Following numerous requests from small-scale fishers, devising a strategy to deal with fisheries-predator interactions in the Baltic, in particular grey seals, based on using solutions non-lethal to seals themselves. The strategy consists in:
 - Initial outreach to scientific institutions (Sweden, Poland, Germany) and decision-making circles (BSAC, BALTFISH, HELCOM) in order to better understand options to solve the problem;
 - In April 2017 organizing a Best Practice Exchange event in Jarnavik, Sweden, in order to get fishers acquainted with technical progress and practicalities aimed at solving the problem from the fishing gear & fisheries technology standpoint;
 - Mainstreaming the seal-fisheries interactions matter, and the urgent need to seek real & constructive solutions at the relevant advisory and decision-making fora (BSAC, HELCOM, BALTFISH), including:
 - Assisting a Member Organization in preparing a request to discuss sealfisheries interactions within BSAC sub-group on Ecosystem-Based Fisheries Management (tabled March 2017)
 - Reporting on the Best Practice Exchange results to BALTFISH (April 2017) and major national conference in Poland (June 2017)
 - Ensuring a broad participation of stakeholders, small-scale fishers included, at a fully-fledged discussion on the matter at BSAC sub-group on Ecosystem-Based Fisheries Management (October 2017)
 - Reporting the above sub-group results to HELCOM-FISH group (in the group's chair stead) and calling on participants to find solutions to the issue within HELCOM

- Assisting and popularizing a Trans-National Cooperation project led by ESKO FLAG (https://balticfisheries.com), meant to i.a. increase awareness & offer constructive solutions fishers-predators interactions and focused on grey seals and back cormorants;
- Facilitating the elaboration of projects aimed at mitigating the effects of predators interactions on small-scale fishers in their concrete regional/local contexts.
- v. Facilitation and assistance of a LIFE Member Organization (Fischereischutzverband Schleswig-Holstein, Germany) receiving a Baltic Sea Advisory Council Executive Committee seat in May 2017.
- vi. A Best Practice Exchange event to summarize the project-supported involvement into ACs among small-scale fishers and its results, encouraging fishers not yet active in ACs to get involved in their work. As a result, Foreningen for Skånsomt Kystfiskeri (FSK, Denmark) have received a Baltic Sea Advisory Council General Assembly membership in February 2018 and C-LIFE (the Netherlands) has pledged to be more active within NSAC.
- vii. Assistance and facilitation in elaboration by small-scale, low impact fishers concerned of written comments relating to 2018 ICES advice for Baltic fish stocks, including participation in relevant BSAC and BALTFISH meetings.
- viii. In response to requests from small-scale fishers in the project area, assistance in preparing and implementing a strategy to offer a constructive response to the proposal for a closure of European eel fisheries in the Baltic Sea, consisting of the following elements:
 - Receiving exhaustive information on the views and observations of small-scale fishers interested with regard to European eel stock management;
 - Drafting, consulting with interested small-scale fishers and publishing an article on European eel management;
 - Facilitating the self-presentation of small-scale fishers' views and observations to the relevant decision-makers at EU level;
 - Participation in a HELCOM meeting to offer constructive solutions in relation to improving European eel catch reporting & data collection, in turn facilitating the improvement of scientific advice;
 - ix. Help in responding to small-scale fishers' concerns relating to various Maritime Spatial Planning actions assistance, advising on opinions, analysis of documents, co-representation and representation where requested. Areas covered: plans to create marine offshore wind energy parks in German, Danish and Polish waters and concerns of local fishers about their fishing grounds; Nord Stream II pipeline and concerns of local fishers about fishing and spawning grounds.
 - x. Actions aimed at presenting LIFE in Finland, Estonia, Lithuania in order to understand the small-scale fishers' situation in these countries and get in touch with small-scale fishers' organizations potentially interested in becoming LIFE Members. This has resulted in 3 organizations joining LIFE and others considering to join.
- xi. Popularizing among small-scale fishers in the project area the example of a fishing community that has successfully withstood the quota concentration pressure stemming from ITQ-type national quota management in Denmark (Thorupstrand) and is successful in its business operations, including a good recruitment of young generations to (small-scale) fisheries profession.

- xii. Undertaking various kinds of assistance activities, on request of fishers, showing the need to provide small-scale, low impact fishers with sufficient quota allocations, pursuant to Article 17 of the Common Fisheries Policy's Basic Regulation.
- xiii. Gaining HELCOM Observer in June 2017 and using it to assist small-scale fishers in the project area through participation in various HELCOM meetings.
- xiv. Organizing a final project conference in Brussels to ensure proper dissemination of project results vis-à-vis EU Institutions and other stakeholders.
- xv. Publishing and disseminating a Best Practice Guide, title: "Low Impact Big Influence", based on the 5 Tutorial films financed outside of this project scope.

5.2 Success factors

a) Bottom-up approach

The success of project activities has crucially depended on starting any action by reaching out to small-scale fishers, who are its ultimate addressees, or by responding to calls for action from them – at the same time keeping a strong focus on achieving the project deliverables as provided for in the project proposal and demonstrated in p. 4.3. of the present Report above. Only on the basis of identifying the problems and needs of small-scale fishers, at best in a direct interaction, can a successful strategy to address these problems be devised and implemented.

b) Assistance in self-representation of small-scale fishers rather than representing them

Many small-scale fishers are disappointed by the actions of those organizations that purport to represent, at European or regional level, all the segments of the fisheries, small-scale included. More often than not, in practice they tend to represent the interests of those financially strongest, i.e. larger scale vessel owners, which often means that the real needs of small-scale fishers are neglected.

This has led to a wider disappointment with the consultation system underpinning the Common Fisheries Policy (CFP), and consequently, loss of belief in the policy itself and their ability to influence its implementation by many small-scale fishers. To overcome this major

issue, it is necessary for the small-scale fishers themselves to be present at meetings and be active in representing their interests on their own.

c) Skillset and dedication

LIFE as an organization is structurally designed to suit the specific needs of small-scale fishers, matching their practical knowledge of and experience in local fishing grounds, marine environment, etc. with CFP and related policy and institutional knowledge, advocacy capabilities, communication tools and the relevant skills of LIFE Staff. At the heart of the multitude of project activities and results, lies the synchronization between the dedication and involvement of the small-scale fishers and their organizations on the one hand, and dedication of LIFE Staff to respond to matters raised by fishers with project actions on the other. This has put LIFE and its Member Organizations in a unique position to offer constructive, practice-based and CFP system-embedded solutions to fisheries management problems. This Report aims to encapsulate this in points 6.2 and 6.3.

5.3 Difficulties encountered

- <u>a) Languages and public speaking:</u> small-scale fishers representing their communities often have insufficient language capabilities and public speaking preparation to successfully make their points vis-à-vis the incumbent policy actors in key fora, such as Advisory Councils;
- b) Time shortages, capacity limits and information overload: small-scale fishers representing their communities are, in most cases, working as fishers themselves. This makes their timelines highly unpredictable, dependent on the weather conditions and business environment for fish sales, with its inherent seasonality. This is a challenge to their availability at meetings and analysing the relevant (and often heavy) documents, which is necessary to successfully navigate the implementation of the CFP and related policy processes. Furthermore, the capacity of small-scale fishers' organizations is by nature restricted because of the lack of means available for their functioning, which compounds the problems mentioned above.
- c) Lack of confidence in the system: the phenomenon described in p. 5.2. b) leads to diminishing confidence of many small-scale fishers in CFP's advisory and consultative system. Therefore, a set of activities directed at winning back their trust in the policy was organized in the starting phase of the project, as part of capacity building exercise. Activities at the level of Advisory Councils have followed but have not (yet) resulted in the activization of all the fishers from the project area particularly in the North Sea region. As a result, the project's involvement in the work of NSAC could have been more pronounced, if there was more interest and engagement in its agenda from the relevant small-scale fishers (in particular, Dutch and Scottish organizations).
- d) "policy tradition" of CFP design & implementation: the Common Fisheries Policy has tended to prioritize responding to resource conservation risks and, by and large, leaving the sector development matters to EMFF and Member States' choice, without offering them tools allowing an in-depth analysis of the practical situations of specific small-scale fisheries, which are by nature very diverse locally and regionally. This often leads to small-scale fishers' priorities and concerns staying "under the regulatory radar" of policy-makers, resulting in numerous cases of neglection, as long as the small-scale fishers do not pose resource conservation risks.
- e) markets and (where relevant) product quality: small-scale fishers stand little chance of succeeding if they continue having to compete with big quantities-based, large retailers-

driven, advanced logistics-reliant, vertical integration-dominated and low-margins fish product markets. Still, a majority of them is forced to do so now, as the current construction of Common Market Organization Regulations and the corresponding national policies do not take account of "class, not the mass" philosophy in using the fish resource. The current actions undertaken particularly by FLAGs and usefully popularized by Farnet, although very important in their own local/regional context, have not yet reached a critical mass needed to genuinely help improve the economic standing of many small-scale fleets. This is highlighted by the STECF 2017 AER report which notes that despite the German, Estonian, Finnish and Latvian, SSCF making reasonable gross profits, "after taking account of estimated capital costs, only the Latvian and Estonian (small-scale) fleets were still making net profits and generating resource rent in their fisheries" (quote from STECF's Annual Economic Report 2017, page 133, last paragraph).

This difficulty is considered the most important one of those encountered in the project and needs a special attention from decision-makers. For certain small-scale fishing communities, it is further compounded by the fact that the product quality too often remains sub-optimal, due to lack of sufficient infrastructure, both at sea and on land, as well as insufficient attention to fish handling practices post-catch.

<u>f) organization of the sector:</u> many small-scale fishermen are affiliated with highly hierarchical associations/structures, comprising both small-scale and larger-scale fishery operators, which often have a traditional nature and date back many decades, in most cases established as Producer Organizations. Although these bodies formally represent the interests of all their members, in practice many of them are focusing on prioritizing, advancing and defending the interests of their financially strongest members, who often dominate their functioning. These, in turn, often run contrary to the interests of small-scale fishers. This gap between the small-scale and larger-scale interests is in many cases further widened by vertical integration processes visible in parts of the larger-scale sector, which are, in turn, supported by quota concentration, i.a. resulting from ITQ-type national quota management systems.

To further compound the situation, the creation of new small-scale fishers' associations is difficult due to the issues mentioned in p 5.3. b) above, as well as rife with risks to operational and economic repercussions of small-scale fishers leaving the "umbrella" structures, which often entails being cut off from e.g. the necessary supplies of inputs at good prices (ice, use of port facilities), established market channels (i.a. loss of access to MSC certification), established communication channels with administration, etc.

6. Lessons learnt

6.1 Best Practices identified

Representation

As regards supporting the small-scale fishers in effective representation of their interests at relevant fora, the project activities show that a balance needs to be struck and links established between the mix of:

- <u>field trips</u> carried out to listen to the ultimate project target group, the small-scale fishers. During the field trips, it is necessary to avoid drawing facile or premature conclusions, and focus on obtaining good understanding of small-scale fishers' problems in their often-unique local context;
- <u>capacity building activities</u> tailor-made to look into the solutions of the problems identified during field trips, prepared in a practical way;
- <u>small-scale fishers' presence</u> at key regional, national and EU fora, applying the principle of self-representation, with extensive assistance prior to and during the meetings, with a view to correct, contextually correct and meaningful articulation of small-scale fishers' interests and views.

The next step is to assist these emerging individuals with explaining the practicalities of CFP's consultative and advisory system, procedures, drafting of documents, etc. – for the actual policy processes and meetings. There are inherent limits to their capacity to act and analyse documents etc., as they usually are working small-scale fishermen and are already engaged in a number of activities relating to their local communities and beyond. It is therefore necessary to continue the assistance given to them, to ensure that they can represent their interests in the policy processes in a meaningful way.

This "improved representation mix" has brought about a genuine change of fishers' attitude towards the CFP's consultative and advisory system. The project has helped to activate a core group of small-scale fishers who are willing to engage deeply and intensively into a meaningful representation of their communities. This, in turn, has resulted in restoring small-scale fishers' will to engage in CFP's advisory processes, which is best documented by their increased presence within BSAC, at both technical and Executive Committee levels. They have also understood wider policy processes and context, in particular at HELCOM and BALTFISH, and are willing to engage in these.

Capacity Building and Exchange of Best Practice

The Capacity Building and Exchange of Best Practice activities have been centred around concrete matters of importance to small-scale fishers in the project area. The technical information has been condensed to make sure the main principles of EU decision-making system, Common Fisheries Policy, Advisory Councils, EMFF and market organization are well understood, without over-complicating matters. Emphasis was put on practical examples of successful projects and engagements, in order to document the added value stemming from using the opportunities provided by the CFP system.

The Exchange of Best Practice events have been conceptualized based on assessing the real needs and issues with which small-scale fishers have been grappling in the project area. The approach was, as for Capacity Building, to show examples of constructive reactions even to the most difficult problems in the project area, such as seal-fisheries interactions. To mark the importance of wide cooperation with institutions that may be of assistance in overcoming these problems, a rule was introduced to invite scientists working on specific topics to each of the Exchange of Best Practice events organized by the project. For cross-cutting matters, such

as markets, an effort was made to ensure a wide array of Best Practice examples, i.a. through liaising with Farnet network.

A periodic review of small-scale fishers' matters

The elevated interest in and positive reception of the project's final conference in Brussels shows that there is high demand among EU-level decision-makers and CFP stakeholders to look more specifically into matters and outlook of small-scale fisheries communities across Europe. This "knowledge-gathering" exercise would certainly improve knowledge of EU-level decision-makers and CFP stakeholders of specific matters relating to small-scale fisheries, thus improving the likelihood of offering tailored solutions to these. A "small-scale fisheries review conference" could, for example, take place annually, with a number of more specific panels to discuss sea-basin level problems. The majority of European fishers deserve such a format to be properly heard and heeded.

6.2 Solutions to barriers identified

The barriers/difficulties identified in **p. 5.3. a) to c)** can be overcome by applying the following methods:

- Transparent approach to cooperation with small-scale fishers, including sharing of information and careful internal negotiation of policy lines to be taken;
- Presenting policy issues using a somewhat simplified (but not simplistic) language, avoiding too many technicalities and jargon;
- Being available to listen to small-scale fishers' concerns at their convenience;
- Providing analytical capacity to help identify elements in policy processes, which need response from small-scale fishers;
- Building confidence through quality of daily work and level of activity;
- Applying the "improved representation mix" described in p. 6.1.

Furthermore, the difficulties:

- identified in **p. 5.3. a)** are overcome by ensuring that interpretation is provided at ACs' meetings, which should be budgeted as a separate sub-line available to ACs within the European Commission grant;
- identified in **p. 5.3. b)** may likely be overcome by using additional compensations to small-scale fishers attending ACs' meetings as made available in the Regulation 2015/242, as well as finding appropriate forms of support for small-scale fishers' organizations, which will not lead to disturbing competition rules.

The difficulty identified in **p. 5.3. d)**, although unavoidable to some extent because of the CFP's competence division, can be usefully overcome by prioritizing the small-scale fisheries development and "class, not the mass" philosophy in the CFP design in a more pronounced way. For example, the action plan for the development, competitiveness and sustainability of small-scale coastal fishing, already present within the current EMFF design (Article 18 paragraph 1.i) of the EMFF Regulation/508/2014) could be used in a much more pronounced way in the successor financial instrument for 2021-2027 programming period. It could be made obligatory for all the Member States having small-scale fisheries sector and be subject to periodic review by the Commission and European Parliament.

The difficulty identified in **p. 5.3. e)** can be overcome by revamping the programming instruments in the successor financial instrument for 2021-2027 programming period, in particular a strengthened and revamped the action plan for the development, competitiveness

and sustainability of small-scale coastal fishing mentioned above. It could contain, for example:

- A detailed SWOT analysis at the level of specific small-scale fishing communities, at regional level within a Member State, particularly in terms of barriers for SSFs to enter high-margins, quality-based fish market segments;
- The relevant capacity-building actions;
- Programming the corresponding investments for EU support in the successor financial instrument for 2021-2027 programming period;
- Implementing the programmed investments.

This work could possibly be done in close cooperation and synchronization with FLAGs and further facilitated by the Farnet network.

It is hard to find a direct or universal remedy for the difficulty identified in **p. 5.3. f)** above. The project experience shows that it takes a local leader to emerge from within the small-scale fishing community concerned, with the capacity, courage and guts needed to take up the duties and risks related to establishing and successfully operating a new small-scale organization. The emergence of such local leaders may be facilitated by the continued capacity-building activities directed at small-scale fishing communities, possibly forming part of the action plan for the development, competitiveness and sustainability of small-scale coastal fishing mentioned above. The emergence of local leaders should be actively encouraged through leadership training targeted at younger fishers. Furthermore, the rules on establishing and operating Producer Organizations (POs), both at EU and national levels, could usefully be revised to facilitate and prioritize the POs' creation by small-scale fishers. The effective absence of appropriate and representative participation of small-scale fish producers in the POs needs to be evaluated and addressed.

6.3 Recommendations

Since the inception as a fully-fledged and independent policy in 1983, the CFP has been developed and reformed, by and large, in response to major developments in European and global fisheries, in particular those impinging, in one way or the other, on the conservation status of major fisheries resources in European waters and beyond. Driven by this responsive nature, the CFP has an in-built tendency to focus its processes on the issues and fleet segments that have the highest impact on these fisheries resources and the marine environment.

Whereas this focus is fundamental to ensuring the overall sustainability of marine living resources and should always be kept, it is at least as important, and very urgent given the precarious nature of many small-scale fisheries communities across Europe, to complement the current CFP with a dedicated package of support tools allowing a tailored approach to their problems. Far too many of them are struggling to survive economically in the short term whilst others have had to sell up and leave altogether.

The key to survive and thrive, on the basis of this project actions and findings, is to **help offer decent jobs in Europe's small-scale fisheries communities**, which is a must if they are to be really attractive to young generations. Only better profits and margins for small-scale fishers, and better working conditions can address an intergenerational problem of renewing the small-scale fisheries labour force. This, as the project activities show, may be achieved by:

- 1. helping small-scale fishers to implement the <u>"class, not the mass"</u> philosophy, i.e. to extract, in a low-impact manner, the seafood of top freshness, best quality, local and traditional nature, and to place it firmly within high added-value market niches. Such products will by nature be limited in quantity, and the CFP should help in placing them in the market segments offering the highest added value per unit of fish sold. According to STECF's Annual Economic Report 2017, small-scale fisheries' (SSF) landings and income show declining trends EU wide, but performance indicators GVA (67%) and profit margins (24%) are positive. Improved access to resources and access to markets is therefore vital for SSF to survive and thrive.
- 2. making an effort to <u>understand small-scale fisheries' situations in depth</u>. The CFP already has useful instrument in *the action plan for the development, competitiveness and sustainability of small-scale coastal fishing*, which forms part of EMFF programming toolbox. Its use could be broadened and prioritized to achieve this aim. Furthermore, the STECF and the data collection system could be more focused on obtaining economic data on small-scale segments, with SSF métiers defined at a regional level (within Member State), to facilitate in-depth economic analyses.
- 3. <u>improvements of the CFP delivery system, so that it can offer tailor-made solutions to problems identified at local and regional level</u> (within Member State). The CFP already has a useful instrument in this regard in FLAGs, which could be given more tools to respond to management problems identified and to provide solutions at this level in a bottom-up process.
- 4. making an in-depth review of the current forms and the practice of sector organization and update the Common Market Organization system to truly recognize specific characteristics of the small-scale sector, and facilitate the implementation of "class, not the mass" philosophy. This should, in particular, take the form of facilitating the establishment of small-scale fishers' Producer Organizations.
- 5. <u>strengthened and broadened operation of pan-European networks of small-scale fishers</u>, including their dedicated local, regional and national-level organizations and representatives, as they are capable of providing the crucial Capacity-Building, Best Practice Exchange, self-representation assistance and advice on local small-scale fisheries management, including using co-management solutions where identified as relevant.


